

Dear Parents and carers,



Today, we mark the feast day of our college patron, St Columba. Whilst as a school community, we will be officially celebrating St Columba Day at the end of Term 3, we acknowledge this important day associated with our College patron.

The word feast comes from the Latin *festes*, meaning 'joy' and symbolises a time of celebration, so on a Catholic feast day we remember and celebrate something or someone important to our faith. There are more than 10,000 officially canonised saints whom the Church celebrates throughout the year and June 9th is our saint, St Columba's feast day.

The story of St Columba dispels the myth that a saint's life is perfect. St Columba wasn't always a saint; he caused a bloody family feud leading to him fleeing his homeland in disgrace; he had some unusual ways, that we would challenge today, like banishing women and cows from Iona claiming, "where there is a cow there is a woman, and where there is a woman there is mischief"; and concerningly he arranged the burying of his friend, Oran, who was alive, under the floor of the Abbey as he felt the building could not be complete without the finishing touch of a living person in the foundation.

Columba acted out of a strong sense of what was important, which to him was sharing the Gospels with others, but in living his life, he certainly needed forgiveness. He was courageous, persistent and showed leadership as he worked towards his goal. St Columba's story reminds us that our students and staff are imperfect, and they may not always get things right. Just like in St Columba's Day, it is by working together that our Iona community can address challenges and stay true to what we know is important.

Our prayer today is one of St Columba's:

Be O Lord,
a guiding star above me,
a smooth path below me,
a kindly shepherd behind me,
and a bright flame before me;
today, tonight and forever.
Amen

Refugee Week

The theme for Refugee Week (18th-24th June) this year is 'Finding Freedom' and this year we are invited to consider what it means to be free. To live without the fear of war, to have your basic human rights upheld, and to live in equality and without the fear of persecution are just some of the examples of what freedom can entail. Every day millions of people across the world embark on dangerous journeys for the sole purpose of finding safety and freedom. From Australia to nations across the globe, settling into a new environment after experiencing the perils of a refugee's journey can provide opportunities for the freedom to live, to love and to dream. In 2023, we seek a world where freedom is not something that is a sked for but something that is a guaranteed way of life. We are reminded that, regardless of our differences, we all share a common humanity and deserve to be treated with dignity and love.

In the final two weeks of term, we will run a goods drive to support the <u>Geelong Settle Well program</u> (<u>Catholic Care</u>). This service supports refugee youth and mothers in the Geelong region to settle well and thrive in their new community by addressing challenges associated with resettlement.

Resettling Refugees:

This service supports refugee youth and mothers in the Geelong region to settle well and thrive in their new community and addresses challenges associated with resettlement. They help teenagers and kids, connect with their school education to find pathways to further their education and gain confidence to achieve their aspirations. As well as Increasing their sense of well-being and giving them the tools to deal with future issues and past trauma. They also help refugee mothers who have the additional challenge of supporting their children through school while navigating re-settlement. Catholic Care help with employment, financial support (food, bills) and other necessities through an emergency relief service.

Online Grooming – Resource for parents – Safe Bedrooms

lona is a child safe school. We take child safety very seriously. We are here to support parents to ensure all of our students are safe from harm. The online space is a common frustration for families.

The following website has many wonderful resources and advice – this one, in particular, focuses on online grooming and what parents can do to recognise, react to and report issues. Safe Bedrooms is a suite of resources which equips parents and carers with the tools to lock predators out. Online grooming can happen to any child. However, 97% of Australian parents and carers hadn't previously considered online grooming a threat.

Through the series of videos and resources, parents and carers can learn about the warning signs of online grooming, how to protect your young person and what to do if you are concerned about a child. By becoming informed, you can keep your children safe online.

The Melbourne University School of Mathematics and Statistics Research Competition gives students the opportunity to conduct mathematics research and solve mathematical problems. Students can work on their own, or in a team of 2 or 3, and there are prizes up for grabs!

Iona College will enter some teams in 2023. Students will have time at school to work on their projects together (or alone if they'd prefer). We will start our projects in Week 9 of this term – the competition ends on the 31st of July!

Semester One Exams – Unit 1 and Year 10 Subjects

In Week 8 of Term Two, Year 10 students will sit semester-based exams in some of their subjects. The following subjects will hold exams

- Unit 1 Business Management
- Unit 1 Health and Human Development
- Unit 1 Art Making and Exhibiting
- Year 10 Maths (Core and Pre-Methods)
- Year 10 Science (Core, Physical Science and Biological & Environmental Science)

For Semester One the exams will be conducted during the students' class time.

The aim of holding exams at Year 10 is to practise sitting formal assessment that spans content and core skills drawn from a full semester. This will help develop some of the skills in students to prepare them for senior studies. Teachers will work with students to prepare them for this new experience.

- It is advantageous in Year 10 to develop good study habits. Students need to balance study with their family and social and extra-curricular activities.
- As students begin to encounter more complex problems and develop the core skills required for senior studies, they need to <u>revise on a regular basis</u> to develop confidence and master core skills.
- Students at Year 10 should be completing the equivalent of 60 minutes of homework and/or study or 90 minutes if they are studying a VCE subject on each school night.

Exams for Year 9 students and further exams for Year 10 students will be held in Semester Two.


