Year 12 Guest Speaker – Sister Rita



Last Friday, the Year 12 cohort had the privilege of hearing from Sister Rita from the Mary Mackillop Heritage Centre, who shared her insights on faith, history and values as relevant to the Jubilee Year: Pilgrims of Hope.

Below is an excerpt from Asher Wescott, a Student Leader in the Culture and Identity space, about his reflections on the morning:

A highlight of the session was the introduction of Luce—this year's Jubilee mascot—whose name, meaning "light" in Italian, symbolises hope and guidance for the journey ahead. Rita also took us students on a deep dive into the life and legacy of Saint Mary MacKillop, offering a powerful reminder of her dedication to education, service and faith.

In an interactive segment, students participated in a Christian Wordle, blending modern engagement with spiritual reflection. The talk also emphasised the theological values and cardinal virtues that shape not only faith but also the foundation of a well-rounded education.

One of the most profound moments of the presentation was the sharing of historical relics from Mary MacKillop's era, including a piece of her wooden coffin. Seeing and learning about these tangible connections to Australia's first saint added a unique and moving perspective to the discussion.

We walked away from the session feeling inspired, with many reflecting on the importance of faith, perseverance and hope in their own lives.

Year 8 LifeChanger workshops Term 1



We are excited that our Year 8 students will be participating in the LifeChanger wellbeing workshops over the next six weeks. These sessions, held every Wednesday, are designed to be engaging and dynamic, incorporating fun and movement to foster a positive learning environment.

The LifeChanger program aims to empower young people by focusing on five key pillars: Health, Skills, Self, Purpose and Tribe. Each week, our students will delve into a different theme, exploring topics such as physical and mental health, mindfulness, goal setting, problem-solving, gratitude, self-awareness and resilience.





These workshops are more than just lessons; they are interactive experiences that encourage students to actively participate and apply what they learn to their daily lives. Iona College – The Duke of Edinburgh



lona is proud to be a registered school that can help students participate in <u>The Duke of Edinburgh</u> International Award.

The Award is self-directed by each young person – they choose the activities they would like to pursue and set goals for each section. Anything that students do as part of their academic timetable program cannot be used for the award. Many students are already doing things outside of school that could be counted as part of an award.

As a registered school, please note:

- The school will help and guide but cannot organise activities.
- Adventurous Journeys must be organised independently from the school through recognised and approved organisations. Outdoor Ed journeys cannot be used.
- For all activities, students will need to provide a Working With Children Card photo of the supervisor before an activity will be approved.
- All activities need to be approved by the school before commencement.
- Students need to be proactive and drive this award personally.

Students will be allocated a staff mentor, but their role is not to chase or follow up on logs and/or activities. If your young person is interested in taking on an award, please ask them to contact me via email to book a meeting. Please see more information below about the award.

More Information from The Duke of Edinburgh

The Duke of Edinburgh's International Award is a unique and exciting opportunity for young people (aged 14-25) to get out of their comfort zone and develop their initiative, self-esteem, and sense of adventure. It is the world's leading youth achievement Award, empowering young people with the skills and opportunities to realise their full potential and go beyond academic success.

The Duke of Ed Award can be achieved at three different levels: Bronze, Silver, and Gold. There are four sections – Physical Recreation (a sport or exercise), Voluntary Service (unpaid voluntary work), Skills (non-physical ability) & Adventurous Journeys. As the levels increase, the time commitment required to complete each level also increases.

At the Bronze level, the time commitments for the Physical Recreation, Voluntary Service and Skills Award sections are one hour a week for 3 months. One section must be a major and requires a 6- month



commitment. All activities do not have to be new for the Participant. However, they do have to be undertaken substantially in their own time, outside of class time.

This means that parents play a vital role in supporting and encouraging young people as they work towards their goals. Some parental guidance may also be required.

The cost for each participant starting their Duke of Ed Award in 2025 is \$210 for Bronze, \$210 for Silver and \$210 for Gold, which includes administrative costs and registration, Online Record Book access, insurance cover and an award-level badge and certificate upon completion.

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award is internationally recognised and can help students in many aspects of their lives. The Award has helped Participants find jobs (both part-time and careers) and apply for both national and international scholarship programs and University applications. Latrobe University's Aspire Program has community service criteria, which are fulfilled by any level of The Duke of Ed Award, increasing your student's chance of receiving a university placement.

Swimming Carnival – Expectations and Reminders

We are excited for our upcoming Swimming Carnival next week Thursday the 27th of February. As previously communicated:

- Attendance is compulsory for Years 7–9 students.
- Attendance is optional for Years 10–12, but students in these year levels must compete in at least two events if they wish to attend. Normal classes will be running for the Year 10-12 cohort, so an expectation is that students catch up on missed work.
- All students must wear swimwear that is fit for purpose rather than fashion-oriented styles. Should the clothing not be at an appropriate level deemed by a staff member, then the student will be asked to re-dress and may be asked to be collected from the venue.
- Additionally, students are required to wear their sports uniform unless they are dressed in their House colours. A reminder that jeans and jorts are not permitted at this event. We encourage hats to be worn.


Art Department News
